

LETTER FROM THE MANSE April 2024

I have been realising that it has been 4 years since we heard that dreaded word lockdown.

I had arrived in Scotland two weeks earlier, into Edinburgh and the Six Nations taking part, with France playing Scotland at Murrayfield. I was able to see Edinburgh completely packed with people who were there for the match.

Then I started my familiarisation placement in a church just outside of Edinburgh and my first day was a Sunday. It was the last day we could be in the church before having to close the doors of the church and not being sure when we would be able to get back in.

The thinking was that it would only last for a few weeks, maybe a month, and then "normality" would resume.

Little did we know how much things would change and we had to find a new normal.

We had to work within restrictions of how long we could go for a walk and how far we could go from our houses. We were living in a time and place of complete uncertainty and wondering what we do.

How do we keep going on as the church in this time when we can't gather in person?

How do we connect with people when we have to deal with limits on how many people we can meet and the distance between each other, not to mention facemasks.

As we look back on those times, which seemed like forever ago, and yet, at the same time, not long ago, what have we learned?

I know one thing that I have learned is how important human interaction, connection and touch is. I am a hugger. I love giving hugs and getting hugs. My family is always excited when they see me because I give good hugs.

Sometimes, it is when we remove so many things that we remind ourselves what is really truly important to us.

When we strip back all of those things that we have done and we just got used to doing and ask ourselves what really matters to us and what is truly important, what is that thing for you?

We have just celebrated Easter. We have shouted our Alleluias and that Christ is risen. We have heard the story of God's amazing and enormous love for us that is shown in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.


There will also be a Match the Number. Allan Cairnduff looks forward to receiving donations of bottles for this stall.

SUPERSTITIONS

Definitions vary, but they commonly describe superstitions as irrational beliefs at odds with scientific knowledge of the world. Here are a few with their origins.

Opening umbrellas indoors isn't the smartest option as you could knock over and break things or cause physical harm to yourself or someone else in close proximity. In ancient Egypt, umbrellas were needed to protect noble and high-class people from the sun. Opening umbrellas indoors was considered offensive to the Sun God.

Walking Under Ladders This superstition often associates with Christianity and the Trinity-the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit-and because an open ladder leaning against a wall looks like a triangle. When someone walks under the ladder, it looks like they're "breaking" the triangle. Not to mention, walking under ladders may cause harm to you and the person standing on the ladder because it can tip and fall or items may land on your head.

Throwing Spilled Salt Over Shoulder Taking a pinch of spilled salt and tossing it over the left shoulder is intended to keep the devil at bay because he sits on the left while an angel sits on the right.

Touching wood The Celts believed that spirits and gods lived in trees. Knocking on tree trunks was done to rouse the deities to give protection or a stroke of good luck if done in gratitude. The other connection is Christians regarding this practice as knocking on the wood of the cross, a symbol of Jesus Christ's crucifixion.

Breaking a mirror The belief that a broken mirror brings bad luck most likely has its origins in the simple fact that reflections of ourselves are uncanny and often unnerving (particularly on a "bad hair" day), so humans have long had bad associations with them. Take, for example, the Greek myth of Narcissus, or the idea that a crack in a mirror would somehow break its charm or trap one's soul.

Fingers Crossed" The superstition of crossing one's fingers to bring the "finger-crosser" good luck comes from pre-Christian times when the practice of making a cross with your own and the index finger of another person was thought to concentrate the forces of good spirits and seal a pact or a wish with the fellow-crosser. Over time, people realised they could simply bless their own wishes by crossing first their two index fingers, and then later simply the index and middle fingers of one hand, which is what we do today.

Break a match It is said that bad luck comes in threes. One theory is that the superstition emerged during the Crimean War, where soldiers were warned against lighting three cigarettes from the same match to avoid being spotted by the enemy. If two bad things happen, you should break a match to stop any more misfortune.

200th ANNIVERSARY OF RNLI

200th ANNIVERSARY OF RNLI

On 4th March 1824 in the trendy London Tavern Bishopsgate Sir William Hilary's vision for a service dedicated to saving lives at sea became a reality when the Royal National Lifeboat Institution was founded.

The story of the RNLI is one of courage and dedication when lifesavers have answered the call to rescue, day or night, in calm seas or in ferocious storms, those in peril on the sea. In the 200 years since the first RNLI lifeboat launch more than 144,000 lives have been saved.

The first RNLI lifeboat in Stonehaven was the St George in 1868. This lifeboat, while on a call to the barque 'Grace Darling', capsized and foundered on the rocks behind Aberdeen harbour in 1874 with the loss of the Coxswain and three of his crew. A memorial to the four men lost stands in Cowie Churchyard.

In 1934 the lifeboat station in Stonehaven was closed.33 years later RNLI stationed a D class lifeboat in the town until 1985 when the station was again closed.

In 2013 the RNLI re-opened the station and an Atlantic 85 class lifeboat is now in operation. Currently there are 32 volunteer members of the crew, 20 of whom are sea-going, and the others have shore duties such as launch authorities and tractor drivers. All crew have to undergo rigorous training and many are Casualty Care trained.

This organisation relies on its running costs to be funded by public subscription and as a result all-round the country there are volunteer fundraisers who work tirelessly to make it all happen. There has been a fundraising group in Stonehaven since 1957 and in that time it has raised many thousands of pounds. Everyone can find a place in this great organisation to help save lives at sea.

Volunteers are at the heart of the RNLI and on 4th March 2024 1,800 of them from all round the UK and Ireland attended a Service in Westminster Abbey to celebrate 200 years of saving lives at sea. Keith Gaskin and Steven Sinclair from Stonehaven were there and described the experience as wonderful.

A crew member from Anstruther Lifeboat has written a new verse for the hymn Eternal Father Strong to Save and it was sung at the service in the Abbey.

> O Lord, entrust their souls safe keep as lifeboats plough o'er oceans deep lend them your courage, strength and grace to those in peril, they must race Oh hear us Lord, a sailor's plea guide all who save lives out at sea.

SESSION SNIPPETS April 24

Although Duncan Begg was presented with his Long Service certificate, you won't be able to see him too well in the group photo on the Presbytery website. Despite being one of the tallest there, he has managed to "disappear" behind the gent on the extreme right of the picture! We have other photos of the Moderator with the different congregational recipients, but not one with Duncan!

Louisa Greenwell is looking to stand down as Presbytery Elder at the end of June – the end of the "Presbytery year". On checking back the records, I found that Louisa has been a Presbytery Elder since the start of the 2007/8 Presbytery year at Dunnottar, transferring to Carronside in 2019. That's a magnificent 17 years' service to our local area. Session is seeking a volunteer to fill this post with many of the meetings being held on Zoom videoconferencing.

The official "For Sale" sign has been erected at the South Church front door but no viewings to date. This could be a long process. We have now been allowed to carry out the urgent repairs to the roof to maintain "wind and water tight conditions". Presbytery and the General Trustees have acknowledged that this work must be done and we're drawing down the necessary funds from the Consolidated Fabric Fund.

Session is looking for help on the Finance front under the following headings:

- 1. Bookkeeping using Xero software
- 2. Management Accounts using budget headings to produce reports.
- 3. Payroll Management & contact with HMRC
- 4. Gift Aid Management

ARH Accountants will carry out these functions but we need some assistance here. You don't need to be an Elder for this – just keen to help! **We also need a Treasurer!**

Seriously, Session must appoint both a Treasurer and an Elder to represent them at Presbytery - these are mandatory requirements. Help us, we pray!

Session has decided to proceed with the total upgrade of the Audio-Visual facilities at Dunnottar. It won't be cheap but most of the present kit wasn't new this century and we should have proper live streaming facilities – so Moira, Jennifer and Sarah will be able to get their phones back!

St BRIDGET'S HALL

This article and photos were posted by the Scottish Churches Trust on Facebook on Friday 15th March 2024. The aim of Scottish Churches Trust is "to advance the preservation, promotion and understanding of Scotland's rich architectural heritage represented in its churches. Every single one of Scotland's churches contains a collection of unique cultural, artistic and historic artefacts telling the story of individuals and their communities, sometimes stretching back centuries. These objects can be of local, national and even, on occasion, international significance."

On 15th March, the Trust decided to combine their FerrousFriday and FlowersonFriday posts into one with a close-up of one of the 'delightful flowers on the decorative iron gates outside the lovely little 'Arts & Crafts era' St Bridget's Church Hall in Stonehaven'. (Their words, not ours..but we agree with the comment!) *You will all have seen these gates .. but have you looked closely at them?*

Built by G P K Young of Perth, with later alterations, St Bridget's was opened as a church in its own right on the 25th January 1888.

In 1885 it was decided by the Kirk Session of Dunnottar Parish Church that they needed a mission church to meet the needs of a growing population, mainly the fishing community of the Old Town. The cost of building was £1300, over half of which was met by funds raised at a two-day sale of work. Items for sale included gilt chairs from Paris and a chest containing 40lb of tea grown on the Fetteresso Estate, Ceylon, as well as fish and livestock- not like our sales these days! The church of St Bridget was opened on January 25th, 1888. It was rededicated in 1970 after conversion to a hall church.

A photograph of the church interior before conversion to a hall church shows fixed timber pews, carved pulpit and large round-headed traceried window to the north wall. The model fishing boat which is on display on one of the windowsills used to be suspended above the nave, a reminder of the fishing community associated with the original Mission Church.

PLASTIC FREE STONEHAVEN

The Villa coffee shop, Enscape Consulting and Sofasoy Candle Co are some of the ever-growing list of shops, businesses and organisations in Stonehaven signing a pledge to reject single-use plastics.

The move for a Plastic Free Stonehaven was first launched back in 2019 by a local member of Surfers Against Sewage - a national movement to clean up our seas. And since some 80% of all the plastic that ends up in our seas is initially disposed of on dry land, the surfers also spearheaded the Plastic Free Communities campaign.

Plastic Free Status is not about getting rid of all plastic. The campaigners say some is very useful and a necessity. Plastic drinking straws are, for some, a valuable aid. Plastic Free Communities is about getting everyone to work together to reduce the town's overall plastic footprint so we can eliminate the unnecessary single-use plastic by addressing the "throwaway" culture we seem to have created.

And today, Cllr Sarah Dickinson and Marion Montgomery of Paws on Plastic have picked up the gauntlet and are touring groups and schools spreading the message. Recent visits include the 1st Stonehaven Scout group, Stonehaven Youth Club and the Community Collective, where they set up an information stand.

Meanwhile, Godsman Graphics recently became the first business in Stonehaven to receive the Plastic Free Champion Award from <u>Surfers Against Sewage</u> Plastic Free Communities. Behind this accreditation were simple actions such as committing to stop buying bottled water in favour of a reusable bottle, presenting marketing materials in cardboard packaging rather than plastic boxes, and storing information online rather than in plastic files.

And of course Plastic Free Stonehaven, together with Paws on Plastic host monthly beach cleans that are proving hugely popular and well-supported. During their March outing, 78kgs of waste were removed from Stonehaven Beach. This included lots of textile fragments big and small, fishing tackle, the usual plastic at all levels of breakdown, an old shoe, an exhaust pipe, pieces of metal and more. All these big and little things really don't belong on the beach and are damaging the marine environment.

If you'd like to do your bit to help Stonehaven clean up its act, then you are welcome to join in on Saturday, 6th April for the next monthly clean with Paws on Plastic as part of Keep Scotland Beautiful's SpringCleanScotland campaign which runs from 15th March – 28th April.
